Our final PTO newsletter of the 2019-20 season is upon us. Over the weekend I reflected on this school year and how, despite many challenges, we have examples of our coming together as a community to strengthen us and to help us find courage. A few examples include:

Starting the year with my own personal challenge of losing my dad. The loss of a parent is immeasurable, but the love and support of our district and the VHE community - staff, families and students - coming together provided me with strength beyond measure.

Throughout the year we came together to share a theme of "Say Something!" using the text by Peter H. Reynolds. In March, staff across the school and district worked together WITH our families to roll out materials for virtual learning. From getting devices into the hands of each student and securing the internet to supporting the use of Google Classroom and resources to link learning for our students, we strengthened our shared vision for learning while staying safe. We continue to face this challenge together with courage.

Supporting connections and showing gratitude in the time of a pandemic is challenging. Our staff have done this with not only classroom Zooms, but also with fun approaches, including musical shares, a virtual field day, and a soon-to-be virtual gallery tour! We began this connection early in quarantine with daily morning announcements and nightly story sharing on Facebook live. Most morning posts continue to get between 200 and 400 views daily! This connection gives us a sense of togetherness and builds our shared strength.

Similarly, our families came together to share their appreciation for our staff during teacher appreciation in ways unlike any other year. Families helped to provide all educators that support our hedgehogs with yard signs and notes of appreciation while respecting the Safe at Home order. We miss you all. Know that this connection was needed and appreciated!

Together we are supporting families that may be experiencing loss as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our families and school community have worked with our social worker, Rachael Nacthwey, to provide those in need with everything from gift cards for basic supply needs to meal delivery. We are coming together to care for each other when it is really needed.



These reflections capture only a part of the year but within each one I read the strength that we each gather from a sense of connection - “togetherness is strength.”

As we begin to turn our thoughts to the summer and the current challenges we are facing as a country and community, my parting message for this time away is to seek compassion. Begin by [listening deeply](#) as suggested in the Susan Verde text read today, “I Am Love.” Seek to not always “fix” or “solve” the historical events we are facing, rather sit with them and find compassion. As your principal, I will work to support staff in continuing to build practices that result in high quality, culturally-responsive instruction for all students. 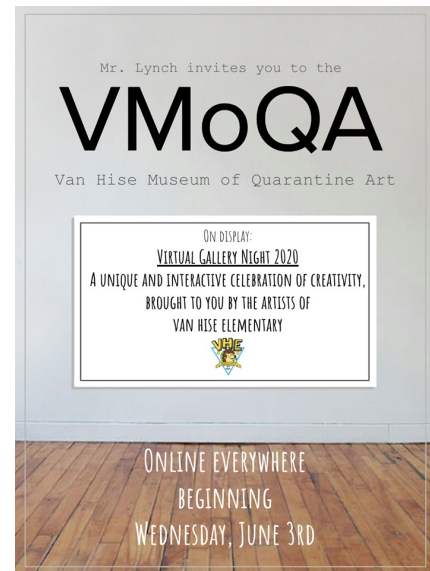

A message to 5th graders from Principal Seidl:

Dear Class of 2027,
Congratulations on your graduation from Van Hise Elementary! Thank you for your hard work and stay-with-it attitude as we close this year virtually. While I would have loved to join you and your families to celebrate this occasion, I am grateful that we are working together to keep everyone safe and healthy, respecting the Safer at Home order.

Long before your time in school, way back in 2003, a movie entitled "Finding Nemo" was released. Fast forward to your first grade year, 2016, a sequel to that movie came out, "Finding Dory." In these movies, Dory is a character that has a very limited memory and often forgets almost immediately what she is told. While this presents many challenges for Dory and those around her, she also has a saying that she uses throughout the movie: "Just keep swimming!" This phrase helps her when she is feeling sad about making mistakes and it also helps her to encourage others who are feeling stuck by fear, anxiety or sadness throughout the movies.

As you move forward in your education, there will be times when you feel afraid, worried or down. There will be challenges and, like virtual learning, you will need to face those challenges head on to move forward. Like Dory, I want you to remember for yourself and for your friends, Just keep swimming!

Now think back to when you learned how to swim. No one starts out with perfect form and, in fact, many fear the water. However, there are people around you to help you learn and grow in swimming. This instruction combined with your practice led you to get better and eventually make it through the water, enjoying it and not fearing it in the end. So too with education - you did not begin your school experience with perfection, but rather navigated your way through the learning pit to adapt and grow. You faced challenges head on and kept moving forward, learning that there are people around you to help you and, with practice, you moved forward. You just kept swimming!

My fifth grade friends, please know that there are people around you who care deeply for you and are there to help you when needed. Know that you have within you the capacity to navigate the water and enjoy it, not fear it. Friends, just keep swimming because there is so much to enjoy!
